

A few years ago I heard Erwin Lutzer say this:

"Let me ask you a question, I don't want to ask you if you're saved; because you might answer that too quickly. I have a different question: 'Is there evidence that God has done a miraculous work in your life that can somehow be



related to death to sin, burial, and newness of life? That, in the Bible, **is** the new birth without which, you will not see the Kingdom of God'?"

ARE YOU A TRUE BELIEVER? <u>DO YOU REALLY KNOW</u> THAT YOU ARE SAVED?

- This is what the Apostle John, Pastor John is addressing.
- Do you really **know** that you're saved?
- Assurances of your salvation.
- Tests that really tell, verify that, yes you're born again!
- Look at His love (v.1). Have you experienced that love?
- Look at your future, (v. 2) and the hope (v. 3)
- And now John develops this same point even further here in our text (v. 4-6) even v. 7 too.
- He continues to develop and explain:
 - o A true believer does not sin... What? Huh? Wait we have questions...

TRUE CHILDREN OF GOD, DO NOT EXHIBIT A SINFUL LIFESTYLE! 3 QUESTIONS HE ANSWERS:

I. What sin is (v. 4)

A. The true nature of sin -

According to **verse 4**, sin is lawlessness, it's willful rejection and active disobedience to the will of God.

KJV "transgression of the law" Greek word is $\alpha vo\mu\iota\alpha-\alpha$ = un, - $vo\mu\sigma\sigma$ = law or lawness

Now:

B. Our bent in the flesh is: inclination, proneness, our propensity to sin! **BUT:** a believer will not, cannot, continually commit sin [present tense] makes a practice of, practices sin. (v. 6)

CONSEQUENCES OF SIN! DANGERS OF SIN!!

- Sin always takes you further than you want to go.
- Sin always keeps you longer than you want (intend) to stay.
- Sin will make you pay more than you want to pay.
- Sin will make you do things you never desired to do; it will make you do things you never thought you were capable of doing.

Isaiah 55:7

II. What Christ did with sin (v. 5)

A. He came, manifested, appeared - To show, become our example, to live in our flesh.

The primary reason for His coming: to forgive, take away sin. Therefore, it is inconsistent with His redeeming work on the cross, for *anyone* who claims His name...to continue in sin.

B. To take away sins – therefore sin has no place in a believers life

III. How we keep ourselves from sin (v. 6)

A. The conflict – abiding/sinning

When you are tempted...will you abide in Him, or sin? There is this: negative – (v. 4) don't sin, because...

To: positive – (v. 6) so, abide in Christ...

B. The second conflict – we are free from sin!

The argument Paul makes in Romans 6:

THE 2ND CONFLICT (ROMANS 6)

Romans 6: I - "What should we say then? Should we continue in sin so that grace may multiply, increase? How can we, who died to sin, still live in it?

Verse II – "So, you too, consider yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus."

Verse 12 – "Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body, so that you obey its desires."

Verse 13 – "And do not offer any parts of it [your body] to sin as weapons for unrighteousness."

Verse 18 – "and after being freed from sin, you became slaves to righteousness."

CONCLUSION:

- Child of God: as much as we abide in Christ we do not sin
- Therefore, when we are tempted crossroads will I live for Him or self?
 Abide in Him or Sin?
- Choose Him: Do you know Jesus as your Savior?
 Are you keeping from sin?
